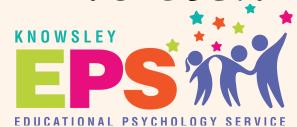

What Is EBSA?

Emotional Barriers to School Attendance (EBSA) is when a child or young person struggles to attend school because of emotional distress.

It is often linked to anxiety, low mood, or other emotional needs that make school feel overwhelming. EBSA is a sign of emotional need, not a behaviour issue, and understanding the causes is essential for providing effective support.

What does EBSA look like?

EBSA can look different for each young person. You might notice:

- Frequent physical complaints (headaches, stomach aches).
- · Distress or panic about attending.
- · Late arrivals or leaving early.
- · Withdrawal or avoidance in school settings.
- · Difficulty concentrating or a drop in engagement with schoolwork.

Why this work matters?

There is growing recognition that schools and services need a coordinated approach to understanding and supporting EBSA.

Early identification and intervention can help young people re-engage with education and thrive.

This work aims to:

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- · Offer practical tools, resources, and training for staff.
- · Create consistent support pathways for schools and families.
- Build a shared understanding of EBSA across education, health, and social care.
- Promote collaborative problemsolving to support attendance and wellbeing.
