

Foreword

Knowsley Council's Budget

The Council gets most of its funding from the Government, and this helps to pay for the day to day cost of services as well as improvements in the buildings and facilities across the Borough. However in December 2010, the Government announced a funding settlement for 2011/12 which reduced the Council's funding by over 20% - and meant that the Council had to address a budget shortfall of £23.6m for the 2011/12 financial year.

This has meant some really hard decisions over what needs to be prioritised and how the Council can reduce spending while protecting the key services that Knowsley residents and businesses depend on. On the 2 March 2011 the council agreed its budget for the forthcoming year and identified the savings it needs to reach its £23.6 million target in 2011/12.

In addition, the Council has also been able to freeze its share of the council tax at last year's levels to help residents.

The majority of savings and efficiencies have been taken from back office processes and lower priority services in a bid to protect the services that are most important to Knowsley's residents.

The savings have been made from:

- Maximising efficiencies from across the council;
- A reduction of approximately 100 senior management positions to make savings of over £4.3 million;
- The deletion of 430 staff posts through voluntary severance, managed redeployment and early retirement;
- Reduced and streamlined back office and support services; and
- Redesigning front line services and reallocating resources from lower priority services

Despite diminishing resources, the budget strategy has ensured that facilities such as libraries and Children's Centres will remain open, eligibility criteria for adult and children's social care will be protected, and key street scene service levels will be maintained for streets, highways, town centres and parks.

A range of key initiatives will also go ahead. These projects include:

- Town centre regeneration plans for Kirkby, Stockbridge Village, Halewood and Prescot will continue as planned
- The replacement of street lighting across the borough will go ahead
- Investment into leisure facilities in Stockbridge Village,
 Prescot and Huyton will be delivered; and
- The investment in our primary school rebuilding and refurbishment programme will continue.

In this way the Council has made sure that public money is being spent on the key priorities facing the Borough and that the Authority gets the best possible value for your money.

Although we have made significant progress to address our budget issues, the challenge continues and we still have significant future financial challenges to address in the coming years. Due to further reductions in Government Grant funding the Council is likely to have to find another £30m between now and 2014.

Your Council Tax

By freezing the Council Tax for 2011/12, Knowsley Council has set a Council tax that is once again below the national average and is the second lowest on Merseyside. The charge for most households in the Borough (those in Band A) will be £830.72. Your Council Tax bill also includes amounts to pay for the Police and Fire services. When these are added to Knowsley Council's share, the annual charge for a Band A household will be £971.39. The charges for all the bands are set out on page 24 of this booklet.

Depending on your circumstances, you may be entitled to Council Tax Benefit, and this will reduce the amount you have to pay. If you need any help on this, please speak to our advisors at the One Stop Shops or Contact Centres.

Merseyside Police Authority

The Police Authority has set a Net Budget Requirement for 2011/12 of £332.645m. The precept, which provides the balance of funding not covered by Government Grant, is set at £61.504m. In council tax terms this is equivalent to £97.49 per property at Band A and £146.23 at Band D, a nil increase on the current year's level.

This position has been achieved through the approval of £20.097m of budget reductions, along with the receipt of a Council Tax Freeze grant, which provides the equivalent of a 2.5% increase in the precept.

During the formulation of the 2010/11 budget, the Authority set a budget of consolidation given the uncertainties of the next Comprehensive Spending Review (CSR) announcement. This has at least allowed the Authority to face 2011/12 and beyond in a financially resilient position, that at any other time, would have provided a sound foundation for future investment in priority services.

In the Local Government Finance Settlement, which covers the next 4 years, (i.e. the CSR period), the Authority has been awarded a net reduction in general grants of 5.141%, i.e. £14.701m, for 2011/12. The level of the settlement awarded to this Authority equates to the same percentage reduction for all Police Authorities in England and Wales. The Government has also provided details of the police grant for 2012/13 and this will see the Authority's grant reduce by a further 6.703%, i.e. £18.182m. Unfortunately, the third and fourth years of the settlement will only be confirmed

following the Local Government Resource Review currently being undertaken by the Government. Therefore, a number of assumptions have been made regarding the likely grant funding in these years.

Consequently, the above settlement has presented the Authority with two very significant financial challenges, i.e. the enormity of the required savings over 4 years (£61.4m) and the "front loading" of the savings requiring £38.5m to be saved over the initial 2 year period.

The 2011/12 budget sets out a strategy for implementing the quickest and deepest cuts in living memory, whilst, by "back loading" the impact on front line services seeks to mitigate, as much as possible the timing of the impact on operational policing. Undoubtedly, this challenge will become greater as cuts run deeper. However, it is inevitable that this impact will grow over the 4 year period.





Merseyside Fire and Rescue Authority Precept Information 2011-2012

The Fire Authority is facing an unprecedented financial challenge over at least the next two years as Central Government reduces the level of grant support. In 2010/11 the Authority received £46.304m funding from Central Government, for 2011/12 this has been reduced by £4.398m or 9.5% to £41.906m. Further reductions of 3.5% have been announced for 2012/13.

The Authority's original medium term financial plan anticipated future council tax increases of 4% or below. Despite the severe cut in Central Government grant

funding the Authority recognises the financial pressures on the communities of Merseyside and has therefore frozen its council tax at the 2010/11 rates. Most council taxpayers in Merseyside pay about 12p per day for the Fire and Rescue Service.

The Authority has set a budget of £69.100 million for 2011/12. This represents a reduction in planned expenditure of £6.422m or 8.5%. This has been achieved by:-

Assuming a 3 Year Pay freeze for all staff	(£2.0m)
Cutting Support Service & Management Costs	(£1.7m)
Being more efficient in Front Line Staffing including changed duty	
systems at Whiston Fire Station and the Marine Unit	(£1.8m)
Using Reserves to avoid compulsory redundancy	(£0.9m)
Net Budget Reduction	(£6.4m)

The Authority has issued a precept on the five Merseyside District Councils of £27.242 million, which is equivalent to a Council Tax of £64.77 for a Band D property. Knowsley's contribution to expenditure financed by precept is £2.729 million, which represents 10% of the total precept.

The Authority has managed to set financial plans that allow investment in line with its Integrated Risk Management Plan and will help maintain its high performing status. The Integrated Risk Management Plan sets out the future strategic direction for the Authority and is available on our website at www.merseyfire.gov.uk.

The Authority budget makes significant provision for investing in the Authority's world leading Community Fire Safety work and Reducing Risk which continues to make Merseyside very much safer. Merseyside Fire and Rescue Authority:

- Was the first fire authority in the world to visit 100,000 households in a single year (and approximately 700,000 visits in total have been carried out)
- Has fitted approximately 750,000 free smoke alarms
- Received Beacon Status for Early Intervention (Children at Risk), Working with Older People, and for Reducing Health Inequalities
- Reduced fire deaths from an average of 20 in 1999 to 8 in 2009/10.
- Is targeting risks using specialist skills in dealing with age, disability, deafness, drugs, alcohol, arson and anti-social behaviour, as well as multilingual specialists.
- Between 2003/2004 to 2009/2010, the Authority has been successful in:
 - o Reducing accidental dwelling fires by 19%
 - Reducing injuries in accidental dwelling fires by 32%
 - o Reducing anti-Social behaviour fires by 61%

This work has successfully reduced the incidence of death and injury from fire in Merseyside.

If you find you are struggling to pay your household bills and are getting further into debt here are a few tips that may help you.

- don't ignore the problem. It won't go away and will probably get worse. The sooner you deal with it the
 quicker your debts can be sorted out
- don't borrow money to pay debts without trying other options first and even then, you need to think very carefully about it.
- pay your priority debts first. These are listed below.
- contact everyone you owe, and for non-priority debts try to arrange to pay back a smaller amount that you can afford. You will need to work out your budget to do this. A form to help you is included on the next page.
- if you can't cope ask for help. There is a list of agencies you can contact on the next page.

Priority debts

These are the debts you should pay first. Listed below are the types of debt and what could happen if you don't pay them. Most organisations will make an arrangement with you but you must contact them as soon as possible.

Debt	What may happen if you don't pay
Rent	You may be evicted from your home
Mortgage	You may have your home re-possessed
Council Tax	Bailiffs can come to your home and take items to sell to pay off your debt. Money can be deducted from your wages, income support or jobseekers allowance. You can be sent to prison.
Gas/Electricity	Your supply can be cut off
TV Licence	You will get a magistrates' court fine
Magistrates' court fines	Bailiffs can come to your home and take items to sell to pay off your debt. Money can be deducted from your wages, income support or jobseekers allowance.
Hire purchase	The items you have bought can be re-possessed.
Income Tax, National Insurance and VAT arrears	Bailiffs can come to your home and take items to sell to pay off your debt. Money can be deducted from your wages, income support or jobseekers allowance.
Maintenance	Bailiffs can come to your home and take items to sell to pay off your debt. Money can be deducted from your wages, income support or jobseekers allowance.

Welfare Benefit Changes from April 2011

From April 2011 the government has introduced some changes to the Housing and Council Tax Benefit schemes. If you are receiving benefits, you need to be aware of some important welfare benefit changes that may affect your income. The main changes you will see are:

- The amount you must pay towards your rent and council tax, if you have a non-dependant living with you, will
 increase.
- The amount of Local Housing Allowance you are paid may be reduced. The maximum £15 weekly excess that some customers can get will be removed and the maximum rate of Housing Benefit will be limited to the rate for a four bedroom property

Charges and Levies

Merseyside Integrated Transport Authority (ITA) Information for Council Tax Payers And Business Ratepayers 2011/12

- 1. Given the severe spending pressures on the Merseyside District Councils, the Authority resolved in November 2010 to freeze its levy for 2011/12 at the same level as 2010/11. However, this was subject to the Department for Transport maintaining direct grant funding to the Authority for the English National Concessionary Travel scheme.
- 2. The Government has decided that the grant funding should be replaced by a Revenue Support Grant mechanism paid to each District Council. The only way in which that money can be paid to the ITA is via a technical levy. For this reason, and this reason alone, a

levy increase of nearly 7% has been set so that the money paid by grant broadly equates to the level of revenue support the five districts have received.

3. Future capital investment on the public transport network will be seriously constrained over the next four years as a result of the Government's Capital Settlement. In 2010/11, direct grants from the DfT totalled £12.7m, for 2011/12 the equivalent sum is £5.7m.

Merseyside Waste Disposal Authority (MWDA)

MWDA is the local authority which arranges for the disposal and recycling of household waste after it has been collected by your council. MWDA also provides 14 Household Waste Recycling Centres throughout Merseyside for local residents to recycle unwanted items.

MWDA has a Corporate Plan which sets out its principal aims and objectives and sets targets for the coming years. An Annual Plan is published each year and details performance against this plan. The Annual Plan 2010 is available from MWDA and shows Merseyside's combined recycling and composting performance hit 34%.



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
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It's the end of the line for anti-social behaviour

Knowsley has its own anti-social behaviour unit, dedicated to tackling ASB. The unit is made up of staff from many agencies such as; Knowsley Council, Merseyside Police, Merseyside Probation, Merseyside Fire and Rescue Service, Housing officers and Victim Support amongst others.



They will:

- Énable and encourage residents, visitors and workers in the Borough to report incidents of Anti-Social Behaviour (ASB);
- Ensure reports of ASB are accurately recorded and monitored;
- Aim to respond to reports of ASB within 3 - 5 working days depending upon the nature of the incident:
- Ensure timely action is taken to investigate and tackle incidents of ASB and to prevent incidents escalating:
- Identify and implement intervention and prevention measures;
- Take effective legal action against perpetrators where appropriate;

- Provide appropriate advice and support to victims and witnesses of ASB;
- Inform residents of the services that the Council and its partner agencies provide:
- Work in partnership with the police and other agencies to tackle ASB issues;
- Ensure relevant staff receive appropriate training;

Charges and Levies

Coroners Service

The day to day cost of running the Coroners Service is estimated at £0.773m for 2011/12. This is apportioned between the Councils of Knowsley, Sefton and St Helens on the basis of population. Knowsley Coroners

Service has budgeted for a charge to the council of £0.188m compared to £0.207m in 2010/11. The figures are subject to final confirmation.

Flood Defence

The Environment Agency has powers in respect of flood defence for 6,500 kilometres of main river and along tidal and sea defences, in the area of the North West Regional Flood Defence Committee. Flood defence money is spent on the construction of new

flood defence schemes, the maintenance of the river system and existing flood defences together with the operation of a flood warning system.

The majority of funding for flood defence comes directly from the Department for the Environment, Food and Rural Affairs (Defra). However, where there are schemes which do not attract central funding the agency may seek funding from County and Metropolitan Councils, Unitary Authorities and London Boroughs in the form of a local levy. The Local Levy is shared on the basis of band D equivalents between all contributing bodies within the Committee Area.

Changes in the Gross Budgeted expenditure between the years reflects the impact of the Government Spending Review and national prioritisation of capital projects.

The total levy raised has remained the same in 2011/12 as 2010/11 at £3,638,000.

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Parish and Town Councils

If you live in one of Knowsley's six parishes your bill will include a "precept" for the budget requirements of your Parish or Town Council.

The following narratives are provided for those councils with precepts above £0.140m.

Halewood Town Council:

Has set a standstill precept for the financial year 2011-12. The Town Council has continued to review its costs in attempts to establish value for money for the residents of Halewood, whilst maintaining its contribution to many annual activities within the Township, including the running costs of its two community centres.

Whiston:

Whiston Town Council has Quality Status and currently operates three Community Centres within the Whiston area. We also lease a number of Public Open Spaces Including football pitches, playgrounds, and a fishing pond as well as providing a Multi Use Games Area all within the Township of Whiston.

We have recently refurbished Whiston Town Hall and continue to maintain all sites to a very high standard whilst keeping the precept at a very reasonable level.

We as a Town Council continue to operate and provide services to the benefit of the Community of Whiston.

Knowsley:

The Parish Council continued to operate three facilities: Knowsley Village Hall, Knowsley Youth Club and the Sports Pavilion (Stockbridge Village). In addition, the Parish Council is responsible for the maintenance of several woodland sites and public open spaces.

The Council provided considerable support for youth and play activities in the parish. The Sports Pavilion was refurbished and a Multi Use Games Area was constructed at the Recreation Ground in Knowsley Village. More improvement work is planned for both the Sports Pavilion and Knowsley Village Hall during 2011/12. Small grants and concessionary prices were awarded to over twenty community groups.

The Parish Council took a keen interest in planning applications and continued to represent local views back to Knowsley Metropolitan Borough Council.

The Council is nationally recognised as a Quality Council. This award places Knowsley Parish Council as one of the very best parish/town councils in the country.

Prescot:

Due to uncertainty surrounding Prescot Town Council facilities, it has been necessary for the Town Council to set a budget based on last year. Accordingly, the Town Council have set a precept of £247,534 which equates to £72.32 for each band D property and this represents a nil increase per property on the 2010/11 figure.

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The following notes form part of your council tax demand and should be read carefully

Council tax valuation bands

Council tax is charged on most homes. It does not matter whether the home is rented or owned, or whether it is lived in or not. Each home is placed in one of eight valuation bands (shown on the front of your bill) based on the amount it would have sold for on 1 April 1991. You may be able to appeal against the valuation band if:

- You have moved into the property within the last six months, or
- There has been a change in the building, or physical state of the local area, which could affect the value of your home.

You must continue to pay your council tax in full pending any appeal decision.

Property exempt from council tax

Council tax is not charged on homes in which:

- Only students live
- Only people under the age of eighteen live
- Only people who are severely mentally impaired person or persons
- Dependent relatives live, as an annexe to the main property (eg granny flat)

Unfurnished empty homes needing major repairs or structural alteration to render them habitable can be exempt for up to twelve months.

An unfurnished empty home will be exempt for up to six months from the date it became empty and unfurnished.

Council tax is not charged on empty homes where:

- A charity last occupied and owns (exempt for up to six months from the date it fell vacant.)
- The person who lived there has gone to prison or is now resident in a hospital or a nursing home
- The trustee of the deceased is waiting for a grant of probate or letters of administration or less than six months have elapsed since such a grant was made
- · Occupation of the property is prohibited by law

- The property is being held vacant for occupation by a minister of religion
- The person who lived there has gone to live with someone else to receive care or has moved to provide personal care for someone else on a permanent basis
- A student owns and was the last person to live in it
- · Repossession by a mortgagee has been taken
- A bankrupt's trustee is responsible

Discounts and disregards

Your council tax bill comprises two elements, 50% property element and 50% personal element. A full council tax bill assumes that there are at least two qualifying adults resident in the household.

If you live alone, your council tax can be reduced by 25%. This is known as single person discount. This discount is not based on your income.

If a property is no one's sole or main residence, then the owner is entitled to a 50 % discount. This can apply to empty and unoccupied dwellings and second homes.

Council Tax Demand Notice Explanatory Notes

Status Discounts (Disregards)

Certain people will not be counted when looking at the number of adults resident in a dwelling. This means that it is possible to qualify for a discount where there are two or more residents

These disregarded adults can be classified as follows:

- Full time students, student nurses, apprentices and youth training trainees
- · Patients resident in hospital
- People who are being looked after in care homes
- · People who are severely mentally impaired
- People staying in certain hostels and night shelters
- 18 and 19 year olds who are at or who have just left school after completing a qualifying course of education
- Careworkers working for low pay, (usually working for a charity)
- People caring for someone with a disability who is not a spouse, partner or child under 18
- Members of visiting forces and certain international institutions
- Members of religious communities (monks and nuns)
- People in prison (except those in prison for non payment of council tax or a fine)

If your bill has been reduced by a discount, this will be shown on your bill. You must let us know if your circumstances change or you may incur a penalty.

If your bill indicates that a discount has been allowed, you must tell the council of any change of circumstances which affects your entitlement. If you fail to do so you may be required to pay a penalty

People with Disabilities

If someone who lives in your home is disabled, and the property has certain facilities to specifically meet their needs, you may be entitled to pay less council tax. These are:

- A disabled person must be resident in the dwelling, and
- A room other than a bathroom, kitchen or lavatory which is predominantly required for meeting the needs of the disabled person, or
- An additional kitchen or bathroom which is required for meeting the needs of the disabled person, or
- Sufficient floor space to use a wheelchair indoors, and the disabled person needs the use of a wheelchair within the dwelling.

If you require more information or an application form for disabled reductions, please contact the council tax office.

Recovery procedure

If you experience genuine difficulty in meeting your payment, please do not put off contacting the council tax office rather than wait until recovery action has been taken. Every effort will be made to assist you in clearing the debt.





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

Do you claim sole occupier discount? Should you be?

The 25% sole occupier discount can be claimed by individuals who are the only adult over 18 living at an address. There is evidence to suggest however that there are a significant number of claimants who do not live alone and who are therefore fraudulently claiming the reduction.

False claims such as this result in higher overall council tax costs for everybody else. The Audit Commission estimated that over £200m of Sole Occupier Person Discounts may be being fraudulently claimed nationally.

Here at Knowsley, we are keen to ensure the cost of this fraudulent activity is not passed on to our law abiding citizens. Commencing in May 2012 we will be undertaking an exercise to identify those households where the sole occupier discount is claimed but where other information sources show there to be a strong possibility that the claim may be fraudulent. Those homes suspected of having more than one occupant will be contacted, and will ultimately have their discount cancelled

That's why we have enlisted the services of GB Group, working in partnership to help remove invalid sole occupier discount claims so that we can ensure we deliver vital public sector services to the citizens who really need them.

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Council Tax Benefit / Rebate

Council Tax Benefit

You can get help with paying your council tax if you have a low income or are in receipt of Income Support, Job Seekers Allowance or Pension Credit. We normally look at:

- Money you and your partner have coming in, including earnings, some benefits, tax credits and things like occupational pensions.
- Any savings you or your partner have over £6,000 (For a pensioner we ignore the first £10,000 of your savings.)
- Your circumstances, such as your age.
- The ages and size of your family, whether you or any
 of your family are disabled, and whether anyone
 who lives with you could help with the rent.

In-work Benefits

You could even qualify for help if you are working for an employer and receiving a low wage or if you have started up in business as self employed and your income is low

If you have a family, the rules on income have changed. We ignore Child Benefit and any maintenance payments for a child and we only take into account the earnings you have left after taking off some of the money you pay for childcare.

So even if you have applied before and did not qualify you might be entitled to help now.

Second Adult Rebate

If you pay Council Tax and do not qualify for council tax benefit because your own income is too high, you might get benefit for other adults living in your home. Second adult rebate can be paid where the person responsible for the bill is single (or classed as single because their partner is disregarded) and is sharing their home on a non commercial basis with someone who is getting income Support, Job Seekers Allowance, Pension Credit or has a low income.

If you already receive council tax benefit, this will be shown on your bill. You do not have to apply again but you do need to let us know if your circumstances change or have changed.

If you have not claimed before or think you might qualify now that the rules have changed you need to fill in an application form available from the one stop shops, most registered social landlords or by ringing our contact centre or downloading from the council's website at

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


