1 Introduction

1.0.1 Welcome to the Report of Consultation for the Proposed Modifications consultation on the Knowsley Local Plan Core Strategy. This document summarises the process involved in preparing and conducting the consultation, and outlines the number and type of responses received.

1.1 What is the Proposed Modifications stage?

1.1.1 The Proposed Modifications stage is the fourth formal stage of preparation of the Knowsley Core Strategy. The Core Strategy is the central document within the Knowsley Local Plan, which is the statutory development plan for the Borough. Once completed, the Local Plan Core Strategy will provide the overarching strategy for the development of Knowsley up to 2028 and beyond, and along with the other documents to be produced as part of the Local Plan, will replace Knowsley's existing development plan (the Knowsley Replacement Unitary Development Plan, completed in 2006).

1.1.2 Earlier stages of preparation of the Knowsley Local Plan Core Strategy included the Issues and Options Paper (November 2009), which presented key issues affecting Knowsley both now and in the future, and broad policy options for tackling these issues. The second stage was the Preferred Options Report (Summer 2011) which set out the Council's preferred spatial strategy for Knowsley, within a series of policies. This explained the range of planning policies which the Council considered to be most appropriate to guide the future development of Knowsley up to 2028. The third stage of preparation of the Core Strategy was the publication of the Proposed Submission document (Autumn 2012). This was the draft Plan which the Council was seeking to submit to the Government, and a consultation was held into the detail of this version of the Plan. The Plan was submitted to the Government for Examination in Public in July 2013.

1.1.3 Following this submission, a Government Planning Inspector was appointed to undertake an Examination in Public into the soundness and legal compliance of the Core Strategy. This process has included two sets of public hearings, in November 2013 and July 2014. Arising from the discussions at the hearings, and the two sets of Interim Findings issued by the Inspector in January 2014 and August 2014, the Council has proposed that a number of areas of the Plan be subject to changes, or "modifications", in order that the Plan can be found to be sound. These Proposed Modifications were the subject of the period of public consultation which commenced in September 2014.

1.2 Purpose of the document

1.2.1 This Report of Consultation document explains the processes involved in the Local Plan Core Strategy Proposed Modifications consultation. This includes the consultation methods used during the public

consultation period, and a broad overview of the results of the consultation.

1.2.2 A separate report, entitled “Proposed Modifications Consultation: Report of Representations” sets out the full wording of the representations received in relation to the consultation, in the order that they relate to different parts of the Plan. This has been published on the Council’s website, and has been forwarded to the Inspector appointed to undertake the Examination in Public. It is recommended that this Report and the Report of Representations are read together.

1.3 Summary of content

1.3.1 This document includes the following sections:

- **Preparation for consultation:** This summarises work undertaken in preparation for the public consultation.
- **Public consultation process:** This describes the activities involved in conducting the public consultation, including events and presentations, publication of materials and information dissemination.
- **Collecting representations:** This summarises the different ways in which responses to the consultation were submitted to the Council, how these were acknowledged and how these were sorted into a form to forward to the Inspector.
- **Overview of representations:** This provides a broad overview of the number and type of representations received during the consultation.
- **Next steps:** This briefly outlines the next steps following the conclusion of the consultation period, within the scope of the ongoing Examination in Public of the Plan.

1.3.2 The following appendices contain selected detailed and technical content required to support this document:

- **Appendix A: Cabinet Agenda, Agenda Pack and Minutes:** This appendix sets out the papers related to the Cabinet meetings at which approval was given for the Proposed Modifications and the commencement of the consultation period.
- **Appendix B: Publicity Materials:** This appendix includes a selection of the publicity materials used to promote and advertise the Proposed Modifications consultation period.
- **Appendix C: List of Respondents:** This appendix lists the names and details of all those who submitted representations to the Proposed Modifications Consultation.

1.3.3 Throughout this document, signposts are provided using an “arrow” symbol, referring to data contained within the Appendices.

2 Preparation for Consultation

2.1 Drafting research and evidence collection: Proposed Modifications

2.1.1 Prior to the commencement of preparation of the proposed modifications to the Core Strategy, the Council produced or commissioned new and revised evidence to support the proposed modifications, including appropriate statutory assessments. This is summarised in Table 1. All of this information is in addition to that produced to support earlier stages of Plan preparation, set out within the Examination Library.

As for previous stages, this has been used to ensure that changes are made to the strategy to maximise the contribution to sustainable development. The Sustainability Appraisal incorporates a Strategic Environmental Assessment, which has assessed and suggested mitigation for the effects of the plan on the environment, in accordance with relevant EU and UK legislation.
Proposed Modifications: Habitats Regulations Assessment Report (2 parts) (document ref: SD29)	The Core Strategy has undergone a further stage of Habitats Regulations Assessment in order to comply with European law and to assess the impacts of the final proposed modifications on habitats, and in particular on "European Sites". Although Knowsley does not contain any European Sites, there are several in surrounding districts (e.g. the Mersey Estuary and Sefton Coast) which could be affected by the proposed modifications. The assessment is presented in two documents.
Various hearing statements (document refs: CH12A, B, C and CH13A, B, C)	These statements were prepared by the Council in response to Matters and Issues raised by the Inspector in advance of the public hearings held in July 2014.

2.2 Review of policy context

- 2.2.1 As part of the preparation of the Proposed Modifications, the Council reviewed changes to the existing policy and legislative context. This was an important exercise to undertake to account for policy changes which had occurred during the Examination in Public period.
- 2.2.2 The most significant change to the policy context over the period of preparation for consultation on Proposed Modifications was the publication of National Planning Policy Guidance (PPG) by the Government. This guidance supplements the policies within the National Planning Policy Framework, and should be given weight in Local Plan preparation and planning decisions. The Inspector conducted a consultation on the implications of the PPG for the Knowsley Local Plan, which was held between 25 March and 17 April 2014. The responses received to this consultation were published in a separate Report (document EX28 - Report of Representations Made - Responses to PPG Consultation).

2.3 Planning for the Proposed Modifications consultation

- 2.3.1 The Statement of Community Involvement (SCI) explains how the Council will involve the community in planning issues. It is a statutory requirement for local authorities to produce and adopt Statements of Community Involvement; Knowsley's Statement of Community Involvement was adopted by the Council and published in May 2007.
- 2.3.2 The SCI explains the Council's preferred processes of consultation for Development Plan Documents (i.e. Local Plan document), Supplementary Planning Documents and planning applications. It also sets out standard methodologies and consultation groups which will be utilised during consultation periods. The Council is responsible for ensuring that the process of Local Plan production is fully compliant with the measures set out in the SCI. This is a critical element of ensuring that Local Plan documents, including the Core Strategy, are sound and eventually appropriate for adoption as the Council's development plan.
- 2.3.3 Since the Knowsley SCI was adopted in 2007, there have been several changes to the legislation which set out how Local Plans are prepared. This includes changes to the statutory stages of preparation of Development Plan Documents, which have affected the preparation of the Knowsley Local Plan Core Strategy. Although the SCI has not been updated during this period, the Council has endeavoured to match stages of Plan preparation as appropriately as possible to the stages prescribed in the SCI. Although the SCI does not contain any requirements concerning consultation at Proposed Modifications Stage, the Council has matched the methods used with those required by the SCI at the "Consultation on Submission Version" stage. The Council has also referred to the Planning Inspectorate publication entitled

“Examining Local Plans: Procedural Practice” (December 2013), which recommends that consultation on Main Modifications. be subject to the same process of publicity and opportunity to make representations as at regulation 19 stage (i.e. Proposed Submission stage).

2.4 Council approvals

2.4.1 The Proposed Modifications to the Local Plan Core Strategy were approved by the Knowsley Council Cabinet at its meeting on 18 June 2014. Following public hearings in July 2014, further Proposed Modifications were approved at the Cabinet meeting on 10 September 2014. The Cabinet agreed that the Proposed Modifications be published for an 8-week period of public consultation.

- **Appendix A** gives links to the minutes of the Cabinet meetings which gave the approval for the publication of the Proposed Modifications for a period of public consultation.

2.4.2 The Council’s Deputy Chief Executive, in consultation with the portfolio holder for Regeneration Economy and Skills, approved on 20 June 2014 and 16 July 2014, supporting materials for the Proposed Modifications to be published.

3 Public Consultation Process

3.0.1 The Proposed Modifications were subject to an 8-week period of public consultation from **19 September 2014 until 14 November 2014**. In accordance with principles in the adopted Statement of Community Involvement, the consultation was wide-ranging, in an effort to involve as many of those living in and working in Knowsley as possible. Methods of consultation included events and presentations, information dissemination and web-based consultation and also involved measures such as making sure that the consultation was widely accessible. These are summarised as follows.

3.1 Publication of materials

3.1.1 On 19 September 2014, the Council made publicly available the Proposed Modifications and supporting evidence. The materials published as part of the consultation included (amongst others):

- Schedule of Proposed Modifications to the Submission Document - Consultation Version
- Submission Document Incorporating Tracked Changes - Consultation Version
- Proposed Modifications to the Policies Map - Consultation Version
- Frequently Asked Questions
- Local Plan Core Strategy Modifications Response Form and Guidance

3.1.2 All materials were made available to the public through the following methods for the period until 14 November 2014:

- Publication of all materials on the Council's website (including versions to be downloaded)
- Supplying publicly accessible deposit locations, including Council One Stop Shops and libraries with the relevant materials (including reference copies of the Proposed Modifications consultation documents, relevant statutory assessments, Frequently Asked Questions, and response forms which could be taken away).

3.2 Information dissemination (public)

3.2.1 The Council made appropriate efforts to ensure that information about the public consultation on Proposed Modifications reached as many of those living in and working in Knowsley as possible. This included the following methods:

- Public notice in the local press (Liverpool Echo, 19 September 2014);

- Sending letters/emails to those on the Local Plan consultation database (including those who submitted responses at previous stages);
 - Sending letters to those who previously signed petitions relating to the Local Plan;
 - Sending letters to addresses within 200m of the sites identified as proposed Sustainable Urban Extensions and safeguarded land;
 - Electronically circulating a consultation update to businesses in the Borough (via Council Business e-newsletter and Chamber of Commerce), and through the Council's Community Messaging Service;
 - Circulating posters advertising the consultation to public buildings, including libraries, One Stop Shops, Centres for Learning and Primary Care Trust premises;
 - Updating the Council's website with the relevant information, including a front-page link to the Local Plan live consultation page which hosted all related documents (as above);
 - Utilisation of "Facebook" and "Twitter" social networking sites to promote the consultation, including linking to existing Knowsley-based networks;
 - Dissemination of information to Knowsley Council officers through internal briefings, blogs, intranet updates;
 - Local press articles including those placed by the Council and those reported by the media; and
 - Placing of site notices at the sites identified as proposed Sustainable Urban Extensions or safeguarded land.
- **Appendix B** contains a sample of the range of publicity materials used to promote and advertise the Proposed Modifications consultation.

3.2.2 In contrast to earlier consultations, the Proposed Modifications consultation included proposed site allocations, to change sites within the Green Belt to Sustainable Urban Extensions. To reflect these site-specific proposals, the Council decided to include letters to addresses in close proximity to the sites affected, and place site notices at the sites, as part of the range of consultation methods used, in order to notify those potentially most affected by the proposed site allocations.

3.3 Information dissemination (specific consultation bodies and Duty to Cooperate partners)

3.3.1 The Council also disseminated information about the public consultation to specific consultation bodies which the Council is obliged to consult in a particular way, including specific consultation bodies and Duty to Cooperate partners. This included direct emails or letters to these bodies.

3.4 Events and presentations

3.4.1 A number of meetings, workshops and presentations were undertaken to promote the Proposed Modifications consultation. These included:

- Seven public drop-in events;
- An additional public meeting held in Whiston (see paragraph 3.4.4 below);
- Written and verbal briefings to Town and Parish Councils; and
- Written briefing to the Knowsley Partnership.

A full list of events and presentations is set out in Table 2.

3.4.2 Where **presentations or briefings** were given, these were tailored to the specific needs and interests of the group receiving the briefing. For example, the Town and Parish Councils received briefings which covered the relevant issues for the relevant geographic locality.

3.4.3 The seven **drop-in events** were held at locations in close proximity to the areas proposed for release from the Green Belt and allocated as Sustainable Urban Extensions. Each of the drop-in events was held over the period from 4pm-7pm, in order to make the events as convenient as possible for members of the public to attend. The format of the events was designed to maximise opportunities for individuals to ask questions of Council officers in attendance, including those related to the detail of the Proposed Modifications, and also the consultation process. At the drop-in events, paper copies of response forms with

accompanying guidance were made available for attendees to take away.

3.4.4 A further **public meeting** was held in Whiston, due to the exceptional demand experienced at the drop-in event previously held in this area. This took the format of a formal panel and audience, with a short verbal briefing from officers, followed by a question and answer session with members of the public.

3.4.5 Each of the five Town and Parish Councils in Knowsley received briefings from Council officers regarding the Proposed Modifications. This included an opportunity for elected members of the Councils to ask questions regarding the proposals.

3.5 Making the consultation accessible

3.5.1 The Council recognises that at all stages of the preparation of the Core Strategy and the wider Local Plan, some of the consultation material would be necessarily complex. The Council therefore ensured that measures were taken to simplify materials and provide succinct summaries, which would allow members of the public and other stakeholders to practically engage with the consultation.

3.6.1 At this Proposed Modifications consultation stage, measures included:

- An offer to provide large-print, Braille, audio and other language versions of materials where requested;
- The ability to contact Council officers by telephone, email, post or in person (at drop in events and during normal office hours at the Huyton Municipal Building) to discuss the consultation and any problems arising;
- A comprehensive glossary included in the full Proposed Modifications documents, explaining specialist terms and acronyms;
- Preparation of Frequently Asked Questions, available online and in One Stop Shops and Libraries;
- Detailed guidance notes regarding completion of representations, attached to the standard response forms provided.

4. Collecting Representations

4.1. Collecting and registering representations

4.1.1 The Council made it clear that representations on the Proposed Modifications to the Core Strategy must be returned to the Council in writing before the conclusion of the consultation period. The Council also made it clear that it would accept responses submitted by email or post, but that it strongly recommended the use of the standard response form, accompanied by guidance notes. This is because the form enabled representors to state relevant factors, such as matters relating to soundness or legal compliance. This form was available to download from the Council's website (either in Word or PDF format), or available to pick up in paper form from Council One Stop Shops or libraries, and from the various drop-in events held during the consultation period.

4.1.2 The Council collected together all representations received, either electronically and in paper form. The Council scanned in all of the responses received in paper form. The response form stated that personal information provided as part of a representation cannot be treated as confidential, as the Council is required to make representations available for public inspection. Therefore, whilst names and organisations of respondents must be stated, the Council has sought to protect personal information included as part of responses submitted, through redacting (i.e. removing) personal data like postal addresses, telephone numbers, email addresses and signatures.

4.1.2 All representations have been collected together in a separate report, entitled: "Proposed Modifications Consultation: Report of Representations". This Report is arranged in accordance with the area of the Plan or general issue to which the representation relates. The Report has been published on the Council's website, and a copy has been sent to the Inspector conducting the Examination of the Plan.

4.1.3 Following this, the Council issued notification via email or letter to those who submitted representations. These representors will be notified of subsequent stages of preparation of the Plan, including the remaining stages of the Examination in Public. The Council has added all of the respondents to its Local Plan consultation database.

4.2 Referencing representations

4.2.1 Each of the representations received to the Proposed Modifications consultation was attributed to an individual representor – either an individual or an organisation. Unique representor ID numbers were attributed. For those who previously had been assigned a representor ID (i.e. through their participation at the Proposed Submission stage), their ID was continued. For "new" representors, that is those who did not respond at that earlier stage, a new ID has been assigned. (NB.

The new IDs commence at ID 121, given that IDs 1-120 were assigned at the Proposed Submission stage). Where multiple responses were received from the same representor, these were clearly labelled as such. In addition, some representations were received in duplicate, i.e. the same content from more than one individual, including standard response forms or letters. The Council also received several petitions in response to the consultation. These have been registered as single representations, against the lead signatory of the petition.

- 4.2.2 For the purpose of the Report of Representations, the Council assessed each of the representations to establish which part or parts of the Plan to which the representation related. This resulted in 38 categories – either parts of the Plan, or broad issues such as Consultation, or Duty to Cooperate.

5 Overview of Representations

5.1 Quantity of representations received

5.1.1 In total, the Council received 2102 submissions to the Proposed Modifications consultation.

5.1.2 As noted in section 4, many individuals submitted different items (i.e. more than one submission per person). Many submissions were exact duplicates of others submitted, including some standard forms and letters. There were standard submissions from Knowsley Village including a standard response form (900 copies received), and a standard letter (625 copies received), which have been treated as individual representations (similar to a petition). An additional 13 separate petitions were submitted.

5.1.3 There were therefore 542 unique submissions.

5.1.4 Of the consultation responses received, some were received from specific consultation bodies, and some were received from members of the public and other organisations. The breakdown of the responses received into those from specific consultation bodies, and those from non-specific consultation bodies is shown in **Table 3** below.

5.3 Main Issues Raised

5.3.1 Within the “Report of Representations”, the Council has presented each of the representations received in relation to the part or parts of the Plan, or other issues, to which they relate. Whilst the Council has reviewed the content of the representations in order to complete the Report, the Council has not undertaken any detailed qualitative analysis of the representations, as it has done at previous stages of Core Strategy preparation. This is because at this stage, the Plan is within its Examination in Public phase, and the Inspector will review in detail the representations received. This and the next steps are summarised in the following section.

5.3.2 By far the most common issues raised was objection to proposed Green Belt release / allocation of Sustainable Urban Extensions. A summary of the total number of unique representations received in relation to different parts of the Plan or issue is shown in Tables 4-6. The figures in these tables do not correlate to the total number of unique representations received, due to representations commenting on more than one part of the Plan or issue, and due to duplicate representations.

5.3.3 As noted, these representations have been published in full within the “Proposed Modifications Consultation: Report of Representations Made”.




